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<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Renuka College was founded in 2001 by the Late Shri Eknath Gedam, 1st President of Renuka Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Nagpur, (MS) a premier trust for the upliftment of the downtrodden with the sheer aim of providing education to the students of deprived and vulnerable sections of society so as to make them self-reliant, and self-sufficient citizens of India. He was a well-known name in the academic circles of the university and he was famous for his altruistic gesture to the needy. The college bears the name of his beloved and benign mother Shrimati Renuka Devi. The college is permanently affiliated with Rashtrasant Tokadoji Maharaj Nagpur University and is accorded 2(f) status under the UGC Act since 2011 followed by 12(B) status in 2013. In the same year, we initiated the process of NAAC and established IQAC in 2015 under the UGC grant to monitor academic progress and co-curricular activities as a quality initiative.

The college is located in Nagpur, well known as 'Orange City' and 'Tiger Capital of India' situated at the 'ZERO MILE' the central point of India. The college is one of the fast upcoming colleges which runs Arts and Commerce faculties as a co-education institute for two UG programs, Bachelor of Arts (BA) in Marathi medium under Grant-in-aid and Bachelor of Commerce (B Com) in English and Marathi medium under self-financing mode and two add-on COP courses, 'Basics of Computer', for ICT literacy and 'Communication Skills and Personality Development' for job oriented skills apart from three value added courses.

Renuka College was started with a handful of students in rental premises in south Nagpur. But with sheer grit and tremendous efforts by the dedicated management and able staff, the college has achieved an important place in the academic map of Nagpur with the help of some developmental grants from the UGC. The important thing to note is that we often get 100% results and produce University toppers despite getting economically, and socially backward students who are either orphans or from very poor families from villages.

Vision

Inspired and guided by the motto of "ATTA DEEP BHAVA" which means 'let's get enlightened', the college has been continuously striving to provide the best education to the students of the South Nagpur constituency, which is an economic and socially backward region of Nagpur. The logo represents the flames of knowledge, peace, prosperity, and enlightenment with deep blue and serene yellow colour in a round shape which represents the Earth.

"Our sole vision is to nurture, nourish & chisel the students especially to make them self-reliant, self-sufficient and knowledgeable citizens to contribute to the all-around progress of the society."

As vision is a stated and ultimate goal to be achieved by the institution we aspire to produce youth with upright minds and enlightened characters committed to contributing to the overall progress of society in particular and the state in general by providing them with quality education.

Mission

As the mission is a path to achieve what is stated vision of the institute our whole endeavour is focused, on "To develop the institution into a reputed brand name for excellence in academics and empower the student with higher learning and research capabilities through dynamic and value-based education for global competency and strength of character."

For adopting our institutional vision and following our mission to achieve the ultimate results we keep some objectives and goals in mind they are:

• To impart updated and socially relevant knowledge disciplines in Arts and Commerce studies which are instrumental in producing well-informed youth for our country's rapid progress.

• To strive for the overall development of students in cooperation and coordination with the parents, guardians and responsible citizens in society.

• To inculcate among the students a sense of discipline, social responsibility and national unity.

 \cdot To provide all possible facilities to mould them into morally strong and mentally tough promising youth to face any internal or external challenges.

• To endeavour to create an atmosphere in the college campus which is free from any extraneous pressures and disturbances that hamper the quiet and conducive atmosphere of learning, research and innovation.

Following the vision and mission to provide a transformative education that inspires social and personal achievement to make the students self-reliant and knowledgeable, the college curriculum is planned and implemented.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

Strengths

- Well-qualified and trained staff with 8 teachers with Ph.D. in their respective fields, with impressive published work to their credit, and 7 teachers are Ph.D. guides in their respective subjects.
- Well-equipped and net-enabled library with LMS, OPAC, e-resources, N-List, and reprographic facilities
- E-Library facility with E-resources and e-books
- Free and compulsory personality development and language enhancement and basics of computer training for students to make them job ready.
- 100% results almost every year in more than 7-8 subjects.
- The college provides a conducive academic atmosphere for students as well as faculty members to actively participate and progress.
- Functional and supportive Career Guidance and Counselling Cell for students' progression and placement.
- Functional Alumni Association visible in job-oriented training

Institutional Weakness

Weaknesses:

- No Government grants for development and research for improving the related facilities.
- Being mainly a Marathi medium college, admissions (intake) are dwindling gradually as many Marathi medium schools are being closed down due to a lack of admissions
- Lack of physical space for further expansion of more courses.
- Lack of sports grounds for track and field for sports to tap the talents of the students.
- Being a traditional courses college there is a shortage of consultancy services and industry-institute partnerships.
- Limited job opportunities for Arts and Commerce students
- Financial constraints for research and development of the college.
- No governmental financial support for self-financed courses becomes a main hurdle in getting qualified staff and other academic facilities.

Institutional Opportunity

Opportunities:

- Research proposals to various granting authorities like ICHR, ICCSR, ICPR, etc. are awaited acceptance.
- A well-equipped conference room and classrooms with AV facility are the need of the hour for which development grants are awaited from the UGC.
- Campus recruitment and student placement will surely increase keeping in view of the fast development plan of the city with SEZ and METRO regions.
- The proposal for opening the M Com program has been sent to the parent University for approval which will be a great help for students' progression.
- Making the Alumni association more proactive by involving them in the development of the college.
- More working MOUs and collaborations for internships and other job-oriented training will be beneficial for students.

Institutional Challenge

Challenges:

- Resource mobilization for the promotion of research and development is a big challenge for a traditional undergraduate college with limited resources
- Industry-based and skill-related courses require trained experts in the field which also entails more finances.
- Due to the paucity of funds and finances, it is a big challenge to initiate many quality-related improvements for the augmentation of infrastructure and new teaching-learning technology.
- A lot of documentation work is a distraction for academic engagement and quality teaching with updating and upgradation of learning.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution follows the syllabus prescribed by the parent university, Rashtrasant Tokadoji Maharaj Nagpur University which updates and upgrades the curriculum every third year as per the present requirements, and two of our faculty members contribute to framing the respective syllabus with POs and COs. The Academic Calendar is prepared before the session considering the university's academic calendar and displayed on the college website, the prospectus as well as on the notice boards.

At the beginning of each academic year, the IQAC convenes a meeting to discuss and chalk out **College's Annual Plan**, and **Academic Calendar** taking into consideration academic terms, teaching days, major events at the university and college level, tentative examination schedules, and other activities. The Academic activities of the curriculum are planned by considering the minute details such as Annual teaching plans, departmental annual plans of guest lectures, workload distribution, remedial coaching, tutorials, practical methods of teaching, internal evaluation, assignments, projects, and presentations. Academic and Co-curricular activities are organized to address the POs, COs, and Learning Outcomes (LOs).

A **Subject Orientation program** in line with the induction program of one week is conducted for the freshers to make them acquainted with the college routine like various curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities, library, sports, NSS/NCC activities. **Freshers' Day** is also organized to give them an opportunity to showcase their latent talents. College Annual Plan, Academic Annual Plan for the teaching of each subject are prepared at the commencement of each academic year in order to monitor the continuous internal evaluation adhered to the academic calendar.

'Environmental Studies' has been made compulsory by the university for second-year students of each faculty to create awareness about the environment. **Two add-on Career Oriented Programs** on 1. Basics of Computers and 2. Communication Skills and Personality Development (Certificate, Diploma, and Advance Diploma) are taught to the students to make them job-ready in addition to 3 value-added courses for curriculum enrichment. A robust and online feedback system is a prominent feature of getting feedback from students, teachers, parents, and alumni with systematic analysis and implementation through action-taken reports by the IQAC.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college has an energetic team of young and qualified staff who are motivated to give their 100% for the allround growth of the students and the exponential progress of the college. The college has **9 full-time teaching staff and 8 temporary staff members with 7 Ph.D. holders and 5 are NET/SET qualified**. The teaching staff regularly update and upgrade themselves with the latest disciplinary trends, research, and pedagogical methods by attending various workshops, orientation programs, conferences, and seminars. They are also trained under faculty development programs conducted under PMMMNMTT's ARPIT, a Govt. scheme for teachers' training.

The teaching-learning process is systematized through Academic Calendar, Departmental Annual Academic Plans, and individual Teaching Plans. Teachers use interactive, collaborative, and ICT tools and methods to make their teaching effective and interesting. Remedial Classes for weak students, Intensive Classes for sharp

and brilliant students, and Tutorial Classes for language learners are conducted in addition to regular prescribed classes.

Every teaching plan includes e-resources, assignments, collaborative tasks, enriched content excursions, different A&V aids, films, and documentaries, and special lectures to enrich their experience through experiential and participatory learning.

The result of the college is quite higher than the university results and we get **100% results in at least 7-8 subjects and program-wise it is 50-60% which is quite encouraging** as we mostly get first-generation learners with poor to very poor backgrounds from nearby slums and villages.

There is an **orderly and continuous evaluation system** (displayed in the academic calendar through the college website and prospectus) which ensures students' regular evaluation and assessment through monthly unit tests, surprise tests, term/half yearly/practice exams, assignments, presentation projects, tasks, visits, and other interactive seminars. After evaluation of their home exams valued answer sheets are returned to them with appropriate remarks for improvement which give them feedback to prepare for university exams. The best answer papers are displayed for the benefit of the average and weak students for better performance. During the COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns (Feb 2020- Sept 2021) we followed the blended method of teaching with Google Classrooms and online testing through Google forms.

Research, Innovations and Extension

To inculcate research culture we have a **Research Committee** which monitors all the publications by individual teachers for reviewing and plagiarism checking and processes proposals for minor and major research projects from different Govt. and non-Govt. agencies. **Three in-house research projects** have been completed during the last five years. Several research project proposals have been sent to ICPR, ICCSR, and ICHR apart from UGC for research grants, and the approval is awaited.

The college has **published 2 books with ISBN** in the last five years in different disciplines. As many as **132 research papers including 79 in UGC-listed and care-listed journals and 17 books with ISBN** have been published by the staff members. 8 Full-time teachers have Ph.D. and five teachers have qualified NET/SET.

In all the college has conducted **16 national-level conferences, seminars, and workshops** apart from local training and research initiatives. The college has conducted one **NAAC-sponsored National Seminar** on 'Opportunities for Excellence in Higher Education', **two national workshops on IPR** (Intellectual Property Rights) as a cluster college's initiative, and one **QIP** (**Quality Improvement Program**) on National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. **The college has 10 functional MoUs** and collaborations for faculty and student exchange, job-oriented training, library facilities, and campus interviews with various agencies, colleges, and universities.

The college conducts various **extension activities** on regular basis through NSS (National Service Scheme) and Project MADAT. **A village, Veda Hari has been adopted** by the NSS for special camps and other social awareness activities. During the COVID-19 pandemic, we conducted the Corona Test RTPCR/Antigen drive, Corona vaccination camp, Food planet and health & Hygiene for VEGAN outreach, Mask making drive, Voter registration drive, Food, and groceries distribution during the lockdown, in addition to regular activities like free medicine distribution, health check-up camp, blood donation camp, tree plantation, awareness rallies, and cleanliness drive. **Under Project MADAT** the college helps the students to get their voter ID, link with election cards and Aaddaar cards, obtain driving licenses, open bank accounts, create e-mail accounts for Academic Bank of Credits, and register in Digilocker through NAD.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college campus has .882 acres of area and a constructed area of 401 sq. mt. with all basic amenities and well-ventilated classrooms. The college has **a multipurpose auditorium**, **a good library with an LMS facility**, a reading room, e-reference section facilities, **a well-equipped gymnasium**, a girls' common, a staff room, a computer lab with a language lab facility and 8 classrooms with ICT facilities. There is **CCTV surveillance** on the college premises to maintain discipline and to check the ragging and harassment of junior students.

The library has a Library Automation System Software, (ILMS), OPAC system, DELNET, and INFLIBNET facility and a decent collection of books, encyclopedias, reference books, and access to **more than 6000 online journals** in different disciplines. The library has a good number of books with a subscription of **7 journals/magazines and 10 newspapers**. The library also provides a book bank facility and interlibrary-loan facility to the students of cluster colleges, a group of colleges in the vicinity. The college library also serves as a public library for the local residents and outside students who prepare for various competitive exams. All the infrastructure, computers, toilets, and equipment are properly maintained and updated through AMC and visit on-call systems.

The college has a total of 27 computers out of which 18 Computers are for students' use and 9 for administrative purposes and 2 laptops with access to the internet that are updated with the latest software. The installation of antivirus and formatting of computers are done on pay on visit basis. The college has VPN Broad Band connectivity with 10 MBPS from BSNL.

Student Support and Progression

The ambiance and the facilities on the campus guarantee a pleasant of which is conducive to learning. The active participation of students and alumni is visible in all the activities and curriculum decisions through the student council, alumni association, and participation of students in various committees and cells. The learning experiences are embedded in authentic and relevant contexts to develop cognitive, interpersonal, intrapersonal, technical, and employability skills.

The college has a **Career Guidance and Counselling Cell** for the students to guide them to pursue their careers and explore their potential. Apart from regular teaching programs, students are imparted free personality development training, language enhancement training, and basic computer training which is a special feature of our college. The outgoing students are also given extra guidance for MPSC/Banking/and other competitive exams. The placement cell and entrepreneur cell regularly organize campus interviews and seminars for recruitment by local companies and give them training for cracking job interviews.

Orphans and differently-abled students are given extra attention to pursue their education. We have a ramp at the entrance, a wheelchair, and a stretcher for specially challenged and sick students. For visually challenged students we provide writers for exams and special software to read library books.

Apart from regular Govt. sanctioned scholarships the college has a student welfare scheme for providing and sponsoring admission fees to poor students. The college has adopted a zero-tolerance policy for ragging,

tobacco, and sexual harassment.

For giving them an opportunity to hone their creative skills we publish '*Shabdankur*' an annual college magazine, a wallpaper publication, and a bulletin board to display their recent writings.

The college has a functional alumni association '*Renuka Maji Vidyarthi Sangh*' to get connected with their alma mater and participate and contribute actively to the overall progress of the college and the benefit of the students. The college avails the guidance of employed alumni for coaching the students to prepare for competitive exams.

Governance, Leadership and Management

There is a clearly defined organizational structure and role of all the members in the institution, which is in the line of participatory management. The College Management Committee (CDC) is the apex body that is formed as per the regulation of the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016 which consists of management members, teacher representatives, non-teaching staff, alumni, students, and three experts from various fields.

All the policy matters are decided at CDC including the college's academic calendar, recruitments, promotions, planning, and budgets. The teachers, non-teaching staff, students, alumni, and experts from outside are also involved at different levels of decision-making in the organizational structure with the flow of communication existing in both directions downwards as well as upwards. Secondly, the IQAC is actively involved in quality initiatives and sustenance of the implementation of plans for the College.

The college has a perspective plan for development which is annually prepared by the IQAC. Concerted efforts are made to implement the plans for making infrastructural development, augment ICT in teaching and learning, enhance research facilities, faculty development initiatives and extend community engagement.

The decisions on academic and administrative matters are made considering the feedback and communicated to all the stakeholders, by maintaining absolute transparency in all matters. The practices of the institution are impartial with strict adherence to the institutional policies which are in tune with the institutional vision, mission, and objectives. The policy manual is made available on the website.

There is an effective implementation of welfare schemes for teaching, non-teaching members, and students, such as group insurance, accident coverage, and health insurance to create a healthy and productive working environment. To monitor the regular progress of the staff the college has a Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) system for annual self-appraisal which is maintained by the PBAS Screening committee which works as a sub-committee under the IQAC to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

E-governance through various Office Management Systems, like Library Management System, and Language lab is done and updated regularly. The IQAC is effectively functional and visible in all developmental issues of the college.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college has many innovative ideas that are being implemented with a positive result of quality initiatives,

improvements, and quality sustenance. In curricular aspects, our best practice is to conduct an **Orientation Program** for subject orientations at the beginning of the session in which students are apprised of all the activities of the college as per the academic calendar and working of the university. They are also given subject orientation and given freedom and flexibility to choose the subjects of their liking and taste. At the end of the session, an **Intensive Teaching Program** is conducted with a separate timetable to revise the whole course portion for students' better preparation for final exams. To improve their communication skills and personality development the English Department conducts a certificate program '**English for Enhancement and Employability'** for all round growth of the students.

A rainwater harvesting unit has been installed for water conservation during the rainy season. The institution has a plastic-free and no-tobacco zone campus as an important green initiative apart from the plantation of nearly 100 trees in different areas in the vicinity and on the campus. For electricity saving LED bulbs are installed in all the rooms and corridors. Waste paper bins are kept at all the strategic points to keep the campus clean and green.

The two prominently working best practices are:

- 1. **PROJECT MADAT,** 'Service to Society for responsible citizens' under the project we help the students in getting benefits of Govt. programs and policies for students such as making an Aadhaar Card, obtaining a driving license, blood donor card, making voting, and other smart link cards and various scholarships. We organize camps for getting the students enrolled in such ventures.
- 2. **PROJECT UDAAN**, 'Empowering the emancipated (Girls)' under the project we help the girl students by making them aware of health, hygiene, women-related laws, self-defense, and safety. We conduct various programs to orient them to female-related problems and challenges. The Internal Complaint Cell (for dealing with sexual harassment cases).

We have '**Study from Home'** app as our Institutional distinctiveness which provides notes and e-content to the students without any hassle. Following our vision and mission quality education is made available through this link on our website to all the students of our college, who come from socially and financially backward backgrounds.

As per National Educational Policy 2020, the institution has formed a cluster of the colleges and are working to offer multidisciplinary subjects to the students. The cluster of colleges has been made for

	the holistic development of the students by encouraging the students to participate actively in academic, extracurricular activities in the cluster. In the line of NEP 2020 the institution recently formed the cluster of colleges and organized -Nine days Quality Improvement Programme to understand and implement the policy of NEP 2020.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The college offers the CBS model as per the affiliating University's directives. The Institution has registered under the Academic Bank of Credits, and the students of the year 2022-23 are registered for the Academic Bank of Credits through Digilocker and NAD National Academic Depository.
3. Skill development:	The institution offers two skills development courses i.e. Communication Skills and Personality Development and Basics of Computers for developing the life skills and digital skills of the students. The institution has also organized a week- long program through N.S.D.C. It also runs soft skills program namely E3 (English for Enhancement and Employability) as well as a value-added course to inculcate optimism, ethics, constitutional obligations, righteousness, non-violence, citizens' rights, and duties, and scientific temper, and moreover life skills among the students for better living.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The institution uses the medium of instruction in Marathi, Hindi, and English. It also offers subjects like Marathi and Hindi for giving importance to the Indian Languages. It conducts various cultural programs in which Indian culture is celebrated and encouraged. We celebrate days of national importance like Independence day, Republic Day, Gandhi Jayanti, ahimsa Din, and birth and death anniversaries of great leaders, like Jotiba Fule, Dr. Ambedkar, Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam, Hockey maestro, Major Dhyanchand, Savitribai Fule, etc.

The institution has developed online study materials, youtube videos, and quizzes for blended learning to improve the learning

Curriculum Planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic Calendar

- At the beginning of each academic year, the IQAC convenes a meeting to discuss and chalk out College's Annual Plan, and Academic Calendar taking into consideration academic terms, teaching days, major events at the university and college level, tentative examination schedules, and other activities. The College Annual Plan which reflects month-wise academic and co-curricular activities in short is placed on the notice board. The Academic Calendar is displayed on the college website as well as on the notice boards for the stakeholders which shows the academic and co-curricular activities in detail. Daily timetables for Arts and commerce are prepared along with orientation classes and intensive classes for the students.
- The Academic activities of the curriculum are planned by considering the minute details such as Annual teaching plans, departmental schedule of guest lectures, workload distribution, remedial coaching, tutorials, practical methods of teaching, internal evaluation, assignments, projects, and presentations through PPT, departmental events, MoU and linkages for faculty and students exchange, e-content development and result-analysis. Academic and Co-curricular activities are organized to meet POs, PSOs, and COs.
- The departmental –annual plan for teaching is prepared by the head of each department and is submitted to the IQAC for approval. At the conclusion of each academic session the Teachers' Council under the chairmanship of the Principal meets with the heads of each department in order to assess the annual plan for teaching is executed in a time-bound manner and at the same point of time, completion report of the planned curriculum is presented before the Council by the various heads of the departments for the approval of the chairperson principal's approval in case of failure of completing the planned curriculum in stipulated time extra classes are engaged.
- The IQAC monitors that each of the faculty members employs various ICT tools for teaching and learning, practical, unit tests, field projects, students' presentations Through PPT, and projects and assignments to ensure effective delivery of the curriculum. The conducts organize seminars, conferences, webinars, and workshops for teachers and students as part of its attempts to improve subject knowledge.

- National festivals are celebrated with zest and zeal to awaken patriotic fervor.
- The birth and death anniversary of the national heroes are marked to encourage the students to emulate their traits.

Gender Equality Sensitization:

- The college tries to create a healthy academic atmosphere between boys and girls. There is equal participation of both in sports and co-curricular activities.
- Women Cell of the college organizes various programs related to women such as women's Day celebrations, and guest Lectures by eminent women of the society. PPT is shown to the students to highlight the role of women in society and to respect them.
- The college works in coordination with its male and female teachers in a congenial ambiance. Regular seminars and lectures are arranged to sensitize the students and staff on the issues of gender equity.

Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment, and Sustainability are also included in the syllabi of Arts and commerce. The subjects of English and Marathi are incorporated with prose and poetry studded with human values. The issue of Gender equity is well-defined in the syllabus of sociology.

Professional ethics are dealt with in the program of Commerce. Environment and sustainability are underlined in the syllabus of Geography and Environmental Science. The students are mandatorily given assignments on the issues of the environment for sustainability development. Ethics and Human Values are emphasized in the subject of Philosophy. Economics focuses mostly on agrarian activities which largely revolve around environmental issues.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

- Experiential Learning: The Institution employs experiential learning by involving the students in assignments, projects, seminars, PPT, Excursions, Field Studies, Industrial Visits, Educational Tours, and visits to Vidhan Bhavan, Nagpur, and Youth Parliament in Pune. Screening of the film or short videos or clippings on the related topic or interview of the writer is conducted regularly to give better understanding to the students for learning. The students are encouraged to contribute their write-ups to the college magazine *Shabdankur* to develop their creativity through experiential learning.
- **Participative Learning**: The faculty members use the technique of quizzes in order to encourage the participation of the students in the process of learning. Students are divided into small groups to discuss the topic which is being taught in the class. Activities are designed to motivate the students to make PowerPoint presentations on a specific topic. Role play is conducted to make the students understand the topic while involving them. Debates are held to allow the students to express their views without any hesitation. The students' seminars are also organized by the faculty members on allotted topics for participative learning.
- **Problem-solving Method**: While teaching the students, the faculty members frequently pose questions before the students in order to use their analytical skills to come to a possible solution.
- **Interactive Learning**: This is the traditional method of teaching through this method the students are involved and their psychomotor skills, and cognitive and emotive skills are touched upon for enriching their learning experiences.
- **Project-based Method**: The students are given projects on the taught topic and they are asked to prepare the project which gives knowledge to the students about the topic while preparing the project the students collect ample information related to other topics besides the project topic.

- **Peer Group Learning Method**: The faculty members form groups of students and they are given a particular topic for discussion and deliberation. They learn better in their peer group and they have difficulties that they could not resolve place before their faculty members who help them to solve.
- **ICT Enabled Teaching**: The faculty members use ICT tools for engaging the lectures by employing Power point presentations, videos, screening of movies, and short clippings for making the process of teaching-learning effective. The faculty members prepare their study materials and are shown on the screen while explaining the concepts to the students for making the teaching and learning interesting and efficacious.
- Use of ICT for Synchronous and Asynchronous Teaching: During the outbreak of the Covid -19, Pandemic regular teaching was disrupted so online teaching was employed to conduct the classes of the students. The videos based on the syllabi were recorded and uploaded on the youtube channel of the teachers. The links to the videos were shared with the students on the Whats App groups formed by the teacher. The students watched the videos repeatedly for better understanding at their own convenience using the asynchronous method. The faculty members also employed the Zoom platform and delivered online lectures and the students attended the classes online and their doubts and difficulties were sorted out instantly using synchronous teaching.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The internal assessment of each subject is evaluated through assignments such as projects, seminars, PPTs, tests, and viva. Other factors are also given due importance such as attendance, participation, and attentiveness of the students in the classes and their involvement in the discussion.

- At the beginning of the new session, Orientation classes are conducted in which the students are made familiar with the mechanism of internal and external assessment of the students.
- Internal assessment carries 20 marks that are divided into three parts.
- 10 marks for assignments that are given to the students by the respective teachers.
- 5 marks are allotted to viva voce or oral exams on the assignments made by the students.
- Remaining 5 marks for attendance and attentiveness of the students in the classes and their involvement in the discussion in the classes.
- Seminars through PPT are given by the students based on the syllabus, which are evaluated by the respective subject teachers.
- **Internal assessment**: Four unit tests and two-term exams are conducted before the university exams. The term papers are strictly based on university patterns.
- Due to Covid 19, the teachers shifted from offline examinations to online examinations. Practice papers are conducted on Google form and the students are able to see the marks in no time results from sheets are preserved by the respective teachers.
- The students are given online assignments in the form of making PPTs and submit them to the respective teachers and the marks of their online practice test marks are also taken into consideration for internal assessment.
- At the college level -The Institute strictly adheres to fair and just treatment of all students in assessment and evaluation. The grievance Cell of the Institute takes care of the grievance of the students related to exams and they are sorted out within a week.
- The institute begins the valuation of the answer sheet as soon as the paper gets over. Checked answer sheets are distributed to the students explaining their mistakes and scope for improvement

in the university exams. Till now there has been no examination-related grievance lodged by the students by virtue of a transparent and robust examination system.

- Due to Covid-19 for the last two years, the examinations have been conducted in online mode through google quiz by the college of backlog students and the university has also conducted the exams in an online mode.
- The students who have faced some technical glitches during their exams have made their applications which are forwarded to the university. The aggrieved students have got the opportunity of appearing in the re-exams conducted by the university and thus the problems are sorted out.
- At University Level- RTM, Nagpur University has the redressal mechanism of showing the evaluated copy to the students if they have any grievances related to the evaluation of the papers i.e. they find that the evaluated paper is undervalued, the student can challenge to valuation. The grievance committee of the college helps the students to resolve their grievances systematically and in a time-bound manner at the college as well as at the university level.

- The college has also adopted the formative and summative approaches to evaluate the learning outcomes and attainment level of the students and before their university exam, they are given intensive training to improve their performance in the final exam.
- The Formative approach (continuous evaluation) is as follows:
- Unit Tests and Surprise Tests are conducted from time to time keeping an eye on the learning outcomes of the course.
- Assignments and Projects are given which are designed to align the learning outcomes of the course.
- Group discussions, debates and Quiz competitions are organized to evaluate the learning outcomes of the students.
- Field visits, excursions and Study tours are held to give firsthand knowledge and experience to the

students.

- Classroom Interaction is the focal point of evaluating the learning outcomes of the students.
- Students are actively involved in college activities in order to allow them to go through the process of learning outcomes and simultaneously they are evaluated.
- Various inter-class competitions are organized viz Essay writing, Poster and Debate competitions to assess the various learning outcomes.

The Summative approach is as follows.

- The Summative assessments are held in the form of four unit tests and two-term exams which are based on the university pattern through which the programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated.
- The progression of the students to higher education also helps to evaluate the programme's outcomes.
- The Placement of the students also helps to evaluate the learning outcomes of the students.

- The Health & Hygiene Survey at Besa Village 2017-18 focused on understanding the health and hygiene practices among the villagers of Besa. 4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 Availability of adequate infrastructure and physical facilities viz., classrooms, laboratories, ICT facilities, cultural activities, gymnasium, yoga centre etc. in the institution

Response:

There is a total of 8 classrooms and 5 classrooms are ICT enabled with projectors and net connectivity. In the remaining 3 classrooms K-yan which is a portable gadget, an in-built computer, sound system, Projector, and Interactive White Board is used. All the classrooms are well-ventilated. There is also a Girls' Common Room. There are 2 Water coolers with a purifier - 2 ROs along with Seven Toilets for boys and five for girls respectively. The college has installed CCTVs on the college campus.

• Wi-Fi facility is made available to the students and the staff.

Multi-Purpose Auditorium- The College has an auditorium admeasuring **2400 sq. ft. area.** It is employed for organizing seminars, conferences, workshops, and various cultural programs. It is equipped with Projector and sound system

Gymnasium- Well equipped Gymnasium is on the ground floor. It has a bench press, weight lifting set, butterfly peg deck, 6-station multi-gym, dumbbells, chest expander, arm curler, body vibrator; treadmill (jogger), stationary cycle, 3. Gym balls, etc.

Library automation- The Library is automated with online OPAC and Barcode system viz.Library Automation System Software. There are five computers available in the library which are connected to LAN. There are two computers with net connectivity that are readily available for students and faculty members. There is a printer and a reprographic machine for providing the facility of printing and xerox. The library has subscribed N-List through which the students and teachers can access INFLIB-NET. The library has remote access to DELNET which has been provided to the institute by the collaborative college from Goa. The library has also a remote login membership of Kavikulguru Kalidas Sanskrit University Ramtek for access to e-resources.

Language Lab: There are a total of 15 computers in the computer lab with net connectivity and are in LAN. Language Lab is installed with Ace language lab software of providing the facilities of the software to 14 computers (13+1).

Geography Lab: Geography Lab has a computer, a printer and a classroom fitted with an LCD projector. It has all the equipment related to the field of Geography.

Cultural Activities: Cultural activities are conducted in Multi-Purpose Auditorium with an LCD projector and sound system.

Health and Hygiene: Frist aid facilities with a medical kit and stretcher and wheelchair are available for sick students and differently-abled children.

Vending Machine for Sanitary Napkins is installed for the girls.

ILMS: Renuka College uses an automated system of Library Automation Software (Web Application) (Cloud Based Lib-Auto 10.0): through Kapson Software & Technologies Company (In Process)

Features of Library Automation Software (Web Application): There are Acquisition & Cataloguing Circulation, OPAC, MIS Analysis & Reports, Accession Series Entry, Subject Entry, Book Title Entry, Issue/Return Master Entry, Newspaper Master Entry, Accessioning Register, Stock Verification, Issue-Return Transaction Report, Newspapers Report, Journal Report etc.

OPAC: OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) is a digital catalogue that offers powerful online search entering keywords such as the name of the book, its title, author's name, etc. through the library catalogue. It saves precious time, work and money to access any reading resources. Students can see the total books of in the library. They can search subject-wise and author-wise lists through OPAC. The OPAC shows particular book records if the book will issue or available.

BARCODE: The library has Barcode system namely-Library automation system software. It's useful for book Issue-Return and Stock Verification. The library has purchased a Barcode device namely 2D Quick Scan WL5 Wireless CMOS Imaging Barcode Reader This device has helped a lot in the work of library books issue returns. When a student requires a book, the accession number in the book is clicked through the barcode device while issuing the book then the clicked number is displayed in the software. And Then the book is issued and returned. In such a way, this process is done through a barcode device.

LIBRARY INFRASTRUCTURE: There are five computers available in the library which are connected to LAN. There are two computers with net connectivity which are readily available for students and faculty members. There are a printer and a reprographic machine for providing the facility of printing and Xerox. There is a reading room facility for both students and staff.

N-LIST: The College library has subscribed N-List Programme subscription of INFLIBNET with access to 6000+ journals and 1, 99,500 e-books through N-LIST which the students, research scholars and teachers can access. N-LIST project helps with research activity and Reference Sources.

DELNET: The library has remote access to DELNET (Developing Library Network) which has been provided to the institute by the collaborative college form Goa- Shri Gopal Ganorkar Memorial College, Goa-Multifaculty College, Dharbhandor, Goa for access to journals, books, and e-resources. DELNET-Developing Library Network, New Delhi is a major resource-sharing library Network

in India. The main objectives of DELNET are to promote resource sharing among the Member-Libraries by collecting, storing and disseminating information and by offering networked library services to users; to undertake research in the area of information science and technology, offer technical guidance to Member-Libraries; coordinate efforts for suitable collection development; facilitate and promote Inter-Library Loan and delivery of documents, etc.

The library has also got the **remote login membership** of **Kavikulaguru Kalidas Sanskrit University**, **Ramtek** for access to e-resources which include a large number of Books and Journals. Faculty members, students and researchers can access these Books and Journals through username and password which can be obtained from the library of Renuka College.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

The college has VPN Broad Band connectivity with 10 MBPS from BSNL. It provides network connectivity to the office, Lang Lab, Geography Lab library, and the computers of other Depts. The college has established mechanisms for upgrading and deploying IT infrastructure. Therefore the college has signed an Annual Maintenance Contract with Shivam Solutions for the maintenance of wireless NMEICT hardware for Broad Band Connectivity, Wi-Fi, LAN, networking, Language Lab Software from Biyani Technology, and Reprographic Machines with Yashraj Automation Services. There are 08 UPS and antivirus provided to all the computers. The college has a total of 28 computers out of which 16 Computers are for students' use and 12 for administrative purposes and 2 laptops with access to the internet that are updated with the latest software. The installation of antivirus and formatting of computers are done on pay on visit basis.

The college has installed AMC software for office and Library administration with Kapson Software and Technology. The Wi-Fi facility is provided to all the computers on the campus.

The library is also equipped with modern facilities like internet access, computers, printers, Wi-Fi, Scanner, Digital Camera, LCD Projector, and Audio-Visual Aids. The library also has a well-stocked digital library with e-journals, e-books, and other online resources. The library also provides access to a wide range of online databases, e-journals, and e-books. The library also offers computer-based services such as online research, online bookings, and online questionnaires. The library also provides services like printing, scanning, photocopying, and binding. The library is also equipped with a number of computers

with internet access and Wi-Fi, which can be used by students and faculty members.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The college has constituted committees for preparing the strategies to mobilize funds from Govt. agencies and Non-Govt. agencies as well as for utilizing the grants and resources.

- The college has two programs Arts and Commerce whereas Arts are fully aided by the Govt. of Maharashtra and Commerce is self-financed. - The college has tried to generate funds in form of money and books, therefore, the college collected 262 from the philanthropist as donations in the form of books.
- The alumni of the college donated 10 books to the college library
- The physical resources are used at optimum level and the human resources are engaged in creative and constructive activities and are developed through various faculty development programs and training, research and conferences, and community-based activities.
- The College building is also given on rent for various competitive exams and hence it is used for optimum level and funds are generated.
- The institution has applied for the grants of RUSA as well as Skills Development for getting grants from government agencies but has not been successful in receiving the grants.

Financial Audit

In today's world, we can see that women are not safe even in their homes and the atrocities on women are increasing. The woman in any society is an indicator of the overall progress of that society. Since Our institute, Renuka College is a co-education institute; we also get girl students also from nearby villages and suburban areas. Keeping in mind girls' multifarious problems which they encounter in any working place and in an attempt to empower them, the college has come up with this unique project, 'UDAAN' (Flight). Under the project, we help the girl students by making them aware of health, hygiene, women-related laws, self-defense, and safety. We conduct various programs to orient them to female-related problems and challenges. As per govt. directives to keep a sanitary vending machine, we provide them with this facility free of cost as and when it is required. Giving them training in self-defense and safety tips is our prime objective. Moreover, they need awareness of health and hygiene-related issues.

Goal:

Practice:

- 1. The college has initiated providing free sanitary napkins to the girl students on college premises. We have an efficient service network through which we help students in distress. This initiative has been in force since 2011.
- 2. In our college, there is an independent Woman Cell since 2009 that monitors all women-related issues. Under this cell, Anti sexual harassment cell, and internal complaint cell work to ensure their safety and security on the college premises.

Evidence of Success:

- 1. Girl students in our college feel free and confident after the inception of Woman Cell under project 'Udaan'.

Free Coaching for Competitive Classes

• The institute has made the initiative of conducting free competitive classes for MPSC, SSC, and IBPS for the students of our college and the colleges of the vicinity on every Saturday. They are provided study materials and book bank facilities, computer and net connectivity facilities from the library. They are also provided guidance in filling out the form for various competitive exams and also helped to fill the form from college.

Providing Free Magazines Facility in the Hospitals of the Vicinity

• The college has initiated the practice of providing free magazines in hospitals which is a great way of providing comfort and solace to patients and their families who are visiting the hospital. It is also a great way of keeping patients and their families engaged while they wait for their treatment.

Women Empowerment

- The institute organizes various programs for the safety and security of the girls. The eminent personalities are invited for conducting workshops on the health and hygiene of the girls, defense programs, nutrition programs, and gender equity. One of our best practices is *Udaan* –Emancipating the girls, they are empowered by various programs organized by the institutes.
- The institute also provides counseling and guidance to the girls for their career and professional development. It organizes various activities like debate competitions, essay writing competitions, leadership training, etc. to boost the confidence and self-esteem of the girls.
- The institute published its annual magazine *Shabdhanku*r on the themes of women, environment, freedom fighters, corona warriors etc. to bring out the creativity of our budding writers .
- Women Cell is set up in the college to resolve the problems of the girls. The Women Cell also organizes Guest Lectures for the girls' students to create awareness among them about Personal Hygiene, Gender Sensitization, and Domestic Violence.
- A gender sensitization program is conducted by Women Cell in order to create awareness among girls about ladies' safety, health care, personal hygiene, physical fitness, and domestic violence.
- The college is a co-ed institution. It makes every possible effort to provide equal opportunities to both boys and girls. The college has instituted a Women's Cell to redress the grievances of the students

- Health Checkup Camp, Blood Donation Camp, and Visit to Old –age Home is organized
- Rally and skits are organized to create awareness among the masses about the environment and to encourage them about tree plantation and greenery.
- Geography Department conducts the program of Ozone Day and Geography Day in which the PPT is shown to the students to inform the causes of the depletion of the ozone layer and measure to be taken to protect it.
- Helping the students and their family members to make their voter cards the students are assisted to open their bank accounts.
- The students, their family members, and the dwellers of Besa are extended help to get voter cards linked with Aadhar Numbers.
- Senior Citizens Wing of Besa regularly conducts the program on the college premises. The college renders all the facilities needed to them for the successful conduction of the program.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information :

The college has a **prestigious place in Nagpur city and among Nagpur University colleges**. Our 7 staff members are research supervisors, two of them are on the respective **Board of Studies** of the University for Curriculum Framework and one staff is **Research Associate** (additional charge) at the university working in the research section for reviewing and plagiarism checking of the research work.

The college has earned many prestigious positions in the university. **University Gold medals** were won by Jidnya Pal in BA 2019-20 (Marathi Lit.), Simran Pathan in BA 2020-21 (Philosophy), and Sejal Punje overall BA 2021-22. Even in sports, Akash Bhoyar won **University Gold Medal** (2018-19) in a 20 km walk, Navneet Devtale won **Bronze Medal** in a half Marathon and Swayamwari Dhole participated in all India **Inter-university wrestling tournament** for two years (2018-19 & 2019-20) apart from our active participation in university-level sports and cultural competitions.

We are also inclined to progress as research partners with other institutes, our association with the **Research Foundation of India and SHIRAN Centre for Research and Awareness, Nagpur (SCRAN), a Research focused NGO** for conducting research-related, NEP 2020 and NAAC-related national workshops, conferences, and projects. We have **organized many FDPs and a QIP (Quality Improvement Program)** in collaboration with cluster colleges for updating and upgrading the teaching staff with 21st-century skills.

As far as our **NSS unit** is concerned, in 2016 the college was adjudged the **Best NSS College**, and our NSS officer, Dr. Santosh Mendhekar was awarded as the **Best NSS Officer** which speaks volumes about our outreach activities towards society. We also undertake **in-house research projects** to help the local authorities by collecting data and conducting surveys for educational, social, health, and financial studies. Even during COVID-19 fighting all the odds our NSS unit has done exemplary work of distributing food packets to slum dwellers, free medicines, and conducting CORONA RTPCR tests for villagers and won the CORONA Warrior award and appreciation from the local authority.

Concluding Remarks :

Being an Arts and Commerce College affiliated to RTM Nagpur University which is the only college located in a comparatively economic, socially, and educationally backward area of suburban Nagpur. Most of our students are from nearby slums, villages, and orphanages who are unable to pay admission fees and purchase college uniforms. The college management arranges to pay their fees from philanthropists and socially conscious citizens. Sometimes the college management and the staff pay their admission fees and bear all their expenses till their graduation.

The Career Guidance and Counselling Cell of the college has conducted **free coaching for competitive examinations** like MPSc, SSC, Banking, IBPS, and others exams which helped a few students to crack the exams in which students of neighboring colleges were also benefitted but during COVID lockdowns this practice got affected due severe financial crunch.

The college had many **UGC grants** during the 12th plan, they are General Development Grants, IQAC grants, 5 Minor Research Projects grants, a few **ICPR grants** for books and conferences, and **NAAC's grant for**

National Seminar (2017-18). These grants and incentives were a big boost for the college to develop qualitatively, get new technology teaching gadgets and become student and research focused. We have also sent a **proposal for RUSA grants** which was submitted but we are yet to get any grants from RUSA, in addition to ICSSR and ICHR research proposals.

The loss of our founder President, the Late Shri Eknath Gedam in 2014 who was a great visionary and wellknown academician, was a big blow to our progress as a rapidly growing organization. If we are supported by Governmental grants for our qualitative improvements and sustenance, it will be a great boost for the institute and big help towards nation-building as today's youth are tomorrow's nation-builders. They contribute a big chunk to the nation's economy more than the elite class.
